# Wedgetail Colin Thiele

*Wedgetail* is another novel from master storyteller Colin Thiele that will be eagerly read by children from middle primary to lower secondary levels. It tells the story of Andy Long, who is passionate about eagles. He lives with his family on a farm near a rugged National Park, and he loves seeing and learning about these majestic creatures. When the ranger, who is a friend of the family, takes him and his sister Katie to see a nest he is rapt. Soon after, however, the ranger brings down an abandoned eaglet and Andy, with his mother's support and against his father's better judgment, undertakes to raise the bird. The neighbour on the adjoining property has been known to shoot eagles and any other creature that he thinks is attacking his stock.

The story relates how Andy forges a close relationship with the eagle and the difficulties of bringing up such a big and powerful bird. Andy knows that one day he will have to release his eagle to the wild, but he does not look forward to that day. Pressure is brought to bear on him by the new ranger who is not at all understanding of the situation and when Caesar is released all seems well as he returns at night to be fed, and thus Andy still has contact with him. There is a terrible twist at the end of the story when the magnificent bird is caught in devices strung to prevent corellas attacking the pecan nut crop next door. Colin Thiele includes lots of instruction and messages in his beautifully written novel for children.

# Speaking/Listening

Talk about:

- Talk about the bond that exists between Andy and the eagle.
- Describe Caesar.
- Who or what are the enemies of wedgetail eagles?
- Tell the story of Lefty's hickory trees. In a roundabout way, Terry Lewis changed Andy's life? (16)
- Outline how.
- After reading Wedgetail by Colin Thiele, do you agree with the new ranger Jim Taylor, that: It's better to let nature take its course?
- Should humans intervene in nature?
- Outline what was involved in caring for Caesar. There is one instance on page 58.
- Relate the story of Caesar, saying what disasters befell him
- What does Andy learn from keeping Caesar?
- Discuss: change, friends, trust.
- Talk about what happens at the end of the story.

- As Andy, do an assignment on wedgetail eagles including as much as you can of what you found out about them from the story.
- Write an email to a friend who has recently gone interstate telling them about *Wedgetail*, the latest book you have just read by Colin Thiele.

- From the story, compile a list of words that describe wedgetail eagles.
- Expand your own vocabulary by experimenting with words and looking up ones that you do not know the meaning of in the dictionary as you read.

## The Craft of Writing

- Colin Thiele writes beautiful stories that are keenly read by children. He is a masterful storyteller and it is worthwhile looking at some of the factors that make him so.
- Colin Thiele uses graphic imagery to make his stories come alive such as: [The eagles] were "*like a pair of skaters skimming on ice*" (6), "*as mischievous as a monkey*" (25) And he's "*as hungry as a hyena*" (55).
- Find some word pictures from the novel that made a scene come alive for you.
